PRAISE, INSPIRATION & CHALLENGE

Hello All,

Thank you all so much for all the volunteering over the summer for the Cathedral Club. It was astounding that with one week of notice, enough people volunteered to fill a summer rota and cook enough food. It was amazing. I am so happy that the numbers picked up the last week and that those families are hoping there might be more holiday clubs in the future.

I know that there are some other "holiday hunger" clubs that happened in Highland this summer organised by the council or other churches. It is sad that our country, one of the world's wealthiest, has hungry children.

The willingness of folk to get involved was overwhelming. It made me wonder if we have a readiness to act that does not have a ready action to do. I have a couple of ideas about that.

My son's old church in London used to ensure that anyone coming out of hospital, after an op or having a baby, or after a bereavement or other cause of stress, an evening meal would be provided for that family for at least a week afterwards, so that cooking was something that they did not need to think about. We live in small communities where we know when people are just out of hospital, bereaved or whatever. Not everyone would welcome a meal being provided, but most people would. Could we have a central online place where, after checking with the family/person that this was something they wanted, we could put up a request for meals and people who were available could offer to cook one meal, until a week was filled? Even if we provided food for a few days it would help. It would be a real sign of the love of Christians for their neighbour. If you think this is an idea you would be interested in, let me know and we can start an online or meet-up discussion about it.

Also, I have read, twice now it was so good, Albert Nolan's book: **Hope in an Age of Despair**. I found it really helpful in considering the current political, economical and environmental situation in which we find ourselves. I think the book could provide six sessions of discussion and I plan to offer these in my house over the autumn. If you think you would be interested, please let me know. To give you a flavour I think the sessions would be titled something like:

God takes up the cause of the oppressed

Kairos: our moment in history

Reading the signs

Contemplation

Speaking out

Seizing the moment

SAINTS THIS WEEK

The MARTYRS of NEW GUINEA (2 Sept)

The church in Papua New Guinea has been enriched by martyrdom twice in the twentieth century. James Chalmers, Oliver Tomkins and some companions were sent to New Guinea by the London Missionary Society. They met their death by martyrdom in 1901. Forty years later, during the Second World War, New Guinea was occupied by the Imperial Japanese Army and Christians were severely persecuted. Among those who died for the faith were two English priests, Vivian Redlich and John Barge, who remained with their people after the invasion of 1942 but were betrayed and beheaded, together with seven Australians and two Papuan evangelists, Leslie Gariadi and Lucian Tapiedi.
