+ The Holy Gospel: John 6:1-21

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Hear the Good News of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Saint john:

Glory to Christ our Saviour!

Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself.

When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.

Give thanks to the Lord for this his glorious Gospel.

Tributes paid to Rev Canon James Alexander

The recent passing of a former rector of St Mary's in Aberdeen received significant coverage in the local press, highlighting the support given by The Rev Canon James (Jim) Alexander to bereaved families and a stunned community following the Piper Alpha oil rig tragedy in 1988.

Canon Alexander, who served for 20 years at St Mary's and 45 years in total in the Diocese of Aberdeen & Orkney, died recently at the age of 94.

The **Press & Journal** and **Evening Express** reported:

The Rev James Douglas Alexander had a wealth of life and ministry experience, starting his working life as an engineer before devoting himself to his faith. He served as a chaplain at Craiginches prison and to the RAF, as well as being a Peterhead councillor and Aberdeen and Orkney canon.

But it was as a senior priest at St Mary's Episcopal Church in Aberdeen that he embarked on the work said to have affected him most profoundly, when Piper Alpha exploded, killing 167 oil workers and upending countless lives. Mr Alexander ensured the church remained open to provide a focal point where families of those affected and the greater community could seek comfort. He was also a key voice after the disaster, determined the inquiry's focus should be on preventing a repeat, rather than simply apportioning blame. Mr Alexander kept preaching and led services well into his 80's, but it was helping in times of tragedy that would most leave a profound mark on the minister. When Piper Alpha exploded, he was the Anglican Church respondent. Press and Journal articles document St Mary's Church being open 24/7 and families spending time there to pray and mourn.

Mr Alexander's daughter, Helen, said: "Piper Alpha was something he never forgot. I remember him telling me about being there with the families when they went out to sea for a memorial service. He said he would never forget the face of a young girl who lost her daddy."
