A STEWARDSHIP THOUGHT

The Blessing of Treasure

We're a little uneasy talking about money, so we call it treasure. At the same time the word is a reminder that material things are all treasures - objects of art, cutlery, fine shoes, debentures and cash the meaning is all the same. And the reason we tend to think of fine things as a group is, for good and ill, they have come to represent cash value. Few of us think of treasure as a blessing, though. Most of us feel we are the dog and the tail is wagging us. We spend too much, or too little. We spend it all on ourselves and are stingy toward others. We spend it on others to influence them. "If I could



just get my budget under control, I'd have enough money and I'd be able to give more, too." But it isn't control any of us really want, but freedom. Freedom doesn't come from having more money. Many wealthy people know that. We size up people by the clothes they wear and judging from the cash value, decide whether or not they are better off than us. The problem with treasure is that we think it tells us something about the people who have it; more "treasure" makes people more important. Money talks. However, all those things and all that money belong to God. Now, that is a tough thing to hear. The way we handle our money will tell us something about the way we think God provides for us. If we find being generous difficult, perhaps it is because we think God can't be trusted to provide the things we need. And if we spend a lot, perhaps it is because we think that it is our money and God doesn't much care how we use it. This is the point where treasure can be a blessing. Treasure, like almost everything else in creation, can be a tool in our hands to help "work out our own salvation." The Bible specifies the tithe - a tenth of what we earn, from the top - as a way to freedom in giving. Money does talk, and the tithe is one way we can say, "Yes," to faith in God's love, to the Church, and to other people in other places who are doing the work of the Body of Christ. The freedom we experience in generosity grows out of the decision to give because we find we are less and less controlled by our whims and the pressure of advertising. It is really possible to be more and more controlled by the Spirit, as St. Paul told the Galatians, and treasure is one of the tools that God has given us; that is what makes it a blessing.

Medical Review Panel vacancies

The province is currently looking to fill five vacancies on the Medical Review Panel. The Panel operates under the Church's Canon 64 and is responsible for assessing and advising on issues of clergy health and capacity. The Panel consists of at least ten "medically or otherwise appropriately qualified practitioners currently in practice who have been in practice for at least five years" and is drawn from the communicant membership of the Church. Appointments aim to encompass a range of professional expertise, including physical and psychiatric medicine and general medical practice.

Members hold office for three years and can be re-appointed to serve for further terms of office. There has in fact only ever been one case brought to the Panel so service is unlikely to be onerous. Members do not receive a salary but receive expenses and normal professional fees when called on to act in a referral.

Church in Society Committee vacancies

The Church in Society Committee is expecting several vacancies from June 2022 and is now inviting applications from across the SEC from people who have interest and expertise in the issues facing our society today.

Pendent to the Mission board, the Church in Society Committee has responsibility for the promotion of the mission of the Church in relation to social, economic and environmental issues and for the oversight of the Church in Society Committee Fund and the Child Poverty Fund.

Currently, the Committee has four priorities: the climate emergency, child poverty, genome editing, and gender justice. However, with a large turnover of membership expected in June, there will be the opportunity to reshape the priorities of the Committee and the church as a whole. If you have a particular interest in a societal issue that you think the Church should be addressing, we would be happy to hear from you.

The Committee manages about 15-20 grants each year, from the very local, e.g. helping congregations purchase school uniforms for local primary schools to the national e.g. supporting our strategic partners such as the Scottish Churches Parliamentary Office. The Committee is always keen to share the stories of our grant recipients, and would especially value applications from people who can assist with communications.
