+ SECOND READING : 1 Corinthians 15:51-58

Listen, I will tell you a mystery! We will not all die, but we will all be changed, in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, and the dead will be raised imperishable, and we will be changed. For this perishable body must put on imperishability, and this mortal body must put on immortality. When this perishable body puts on imperishability, and this mortal body puts on immortality, then the saying that is written will be fulfilled:

'Death has been swallowed up in victory.'

'Where, O death, is your victory?

Where, O death, is your sting?'

The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

Hear the Good News of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Saint Luke:

Glory to Christ our Saviour!

Jesus also told them a parable: 'Can a blind person guide a blind person? Will not both fall into a pit? A disciple is not above the teacher, but everyone who is fully qualified will be like the teacher. Why do you see the speck in your neighbour's eye, but do not notice the log in your own eye? Or how can you say to your neighbour, "Friend, let me take out the speck in your eye", when you yourself do not see the log in your own eye? You hypocrite, first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your neighbour's eye.

'No good tree bears bad fruit, nor again does a bad tree bear good fruit; for each tree is known by its own fruit. Figs are not gathered from thorns, nor are grapes picked from a bramble bush. The good person out of the good treasure of the heart produces good, and the evil person out of evil treasure produces evil; for it is out of the abundance of the heart that the mouth speaks.

'Why do you call me "Lord, Lord", and do not do what I tell you? I will show you what someone is like who comes to me, hears my words, and acts on them. That one is like a man building a house, who dug deeply and laid the foundation on rock; when a flood arose, the river burst against that house but could not shake it, because it had been well built. But the one who hears and does not act is like a man who built a house on the ground without a foundation. When the river burst against it, immediately it fell, and great was the ruin of that house.'

Give thanks to the Lord for this his glorious Gospel.

Conclude with the Lord's Prayer.


A STEWARDSHIP THOUGHT



LEARNING FROM ZACCHAEUS

In Luke's Gospel there is a story about Jesus' encounter with Zacchaeus, the rich superintendent of taxes in Jericho. Zacchaeus, who had heard of the teacher from Nazareth, wanted to see Jesus as he passed through town; but Zacchaeus was a short man, and the crowds around Jesus were huge. So Zacchaeus climbed up into a tree by the roadside in order to get a better view as Jesus passed by. Suddenly, to Zacchaeus's surprise, Jesus was speaking to him from the road below: When Jesus came to the place, he looked up and said, "Zacchaeus, be quick and come down; I must come and stay with you today." He climbed down as fast as he could, and welcomed him gladly. At this there was a general murmur of disapproval. "He has gone in" they said, "to be the guest of a sinner." But Zacchaeus stood there and said to the Lord, "Here and now, sir, I give half my possessions to charity; and if I have cheated anyone, I am ready to repay him four times over." Jesus said to him, "salvation has come to this house today!" (Luke 19:5-9)

What happened to Zacchaeus? The answer is simple enough. Zacchaeus's encounter with Jesus has caused him to repent of his sins, and his free gift to charity of one-half of his possessions is the most concrete expression of Zacchaeus's real thanksgiving for his new-found salvation. Sacrificial giving of one's money to God's Church can contain the same element of repentance as that found in Jesus' encounter with Zacchaeus. It all depends upon whether we give because we are thankful for our salvation or give for some other reason. To most people today the idea of thankfulness, especially in relation to salvation, seems foreign. But if you think about it for a moment, thankfulness and worship are closely related. For example, a prayer may thank God for some blessing. True Christian worship without thankfulness is almost impossible. If we encounter Jesus' loving grace and forgiveness, our first response must be thankfulness to God for this wonderful gift. But giving and repentance are very much related. By giving sacrificially, we show that we are willing to put our money behind our thankfulness and our faith. Like Zacchaeus, our faith is made into example by our willingness to work, pray, and give for the success of God's Kingdom on earth.

Dear All,

Well, here we are – staring at the end of February already! And, after a lovely long Epiphany Season, we prepare to welcome Lent this coming Wednesday!

I will be available to hear Confessions on Shrove Tuesday at 10:30 am in St Andrew's – for any who wish to avail themselves of this Sacrament. If you'd like more information, please let me know. Shrove comes from the Old English and means "to forgive". It is a traditional day when those wishing to keep a holy Lent and, having been separated from the Church through sin and desiring to be forgiven and reconciled, came to make their confession and set off on the right foot. It is often referred to as Pancake Day, Mardi Gras and Carnival (carni-vale)...all of which have to do with getting rid of all meat and dairy products as such things were automatically given up until Easter.

Lent is a time for increased prayer – so please make time and aim to be present through the season...on Sundays and at some mid week event. It is a time for Fasting – so please consider giving up something...preferably something that will also benefit you bodily and spiritually. Lent is also a time for giving – so consider upping support of the charities of your choice and helping all who are less fortunate. It is also a time for study and reflection – consider one of the study events listed in this newsletter!

I am sure I am not the only one keeping an (I confess) anxious eye on the situation between Ukraine and Russia. It is quite worrying. Let us pray for God's peace to fill all hearts...and, remembering the wisdom of the old hymn, "What a Friend we have in Jesus", leave it all in His capable hands.


