

THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD cont.

+ FIRST READING : Genesis 15:1-12,17-18

The word of the Lord came to Abram in a vision, "Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great." But Abram said, "O Lord God, what will you give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Eliezer of Damascus?" And Abram said, "You have given me no offspring, and so a slave born in my house is to be my heir." But the word of the Lord came to him, "This man shall not be your heir; no one but your very own issue shall be your heir." He brought him outside and said, "Look toward heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them." Then he said to him, "So shall your descendants be." And he believed the Lord; and the Lord reckoned it to him as righteousness.

Then he said to him, "I am the Lord who brought you from Ur of the Chaldeans, to give you this land to possess." But he said, "O Lord God, how am I to know that I shall possess it?" He said to him, "Bring me a heifer three years old, a female goat three years old, a ram three years old, a turtledove, and a young pigeon." He brought him all these and cut them in two, laying each half over against the other; but he did not cut the birds in two. And when birds of prey came down on the carcasses, Abram drove them away.

As the sun was going down, a deep sleep fell upon Abram, and a deep and terrifying darkness descended upon him.

When the sun had gone down and it was dark, a smoking fire pot and a flaming torch passed between these pieces. On that day the Lord made a covenant with Abram, saying, "To your descendants I give this land, from the river of Egypt to the great river, the river Euphrates."

Now about eight days after these sayings Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, 'Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah'—not knowing what he said. While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, 'This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!' When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.

A STEWARDSHIP THOUGHT



GRATITUDE

When we were children we loved magic words which we imagined could transform things. With Shazam! we could turn ourselves into Captain Marvel and other such heroes. By saying abracadabra we could make things appear or disappear.

Our parents, however, may have told us that the magic word was "please." That was how we got things. We may even have been told to say "please" in our prayers.

Archbishop William Temple wrote that "it is more important to thank God for blessings received than to pray for them beforehand. For that forward-looking prayer, though right as an expression of dependence upon God, is still self-centred in part ... But the backward-looking act of thanksgiving is quite free from this... This is akin to love." Meister Eckhart maintained that "if the only prayer you say in your whole life is 'thank you,' that would suffice."

Perhaps there are people today who think there are no magic words C not even "thanks." But have we not all seen circumstances and situations transformed by words and acts of thanksgiving? Anger is turned aside. Envy is overcome. Depression and self-pity can be buoyed up when we remember to be thankful.

Those of us who are blessed in life have the magical opportunity to lift our own spirits and to give joy to others by expressing our gratitude through sharing what we have.

One of the happiest aspects of the Bible is all the thanks and praise it contains. David's arms are upraised before the Lord, rejoicing because "I have seen thy people, who are present here, offering freely and joyously to you." The psalmist urges that we make a "joyful noise to the Lord" and "enter God's gates with thanksgiving." Even in prison Paul pours out his thanks to God.

The poet George Herbert prays for the magic of thanksgiving which we can all express in our lives with our words and through our generous gifts:

"Thou that hast given so much to me, Give one thing more, a grateful heart.... Not thankful, when it pleaseth me; As if Thy blessing hid spare days: But such a heart, whose pulse may be Thy praise."

"Jesus sat down opposite the treasury and watched the crowd putting money into the treasury. Many rich people put in large sums. A poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which are worth a penny. Then he called his disciples and said to them, 'Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the treasury. For all of them have contributed out of their abundance; but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on." [Mark 12:41-44]

In this story of Jesus observing the poor widow in the temple, Mark gives us a perfect example of how personal sacrifice plays a major theological role in meaningful stewardship. The comparison drawn between the rich, who can afford to give generously and regularly to the temple, and the poor widow, who gives to the treasury sacrificially, is dramatic. Please notice. Jesus is not recorded as saying that the gifts of the wealthy are valueless or insignificant. He does not say that the rich should not give; nor does Jesus say that the poor widow is somehow a better person because she is poor and gives. What Jesus notes is that the rich are not giving sacrificially, and the poor widow is.

For /

For our modern giving to the Church to express truly our deep faith in Jesus Christ, we too need to give to the treasury of the Church with sacrifice. If it is too easy for us to give a little, then we have not given enough. If we fall into the ease of offering to our Church whatever we have left over to give, and not the first fruits of our income, then we show to God and the world that our priorities are focused on ourselves. This is why tithing is so important to the Episcopal Church as a standard of giving; it provides a biblically based, sacrificial level of giving that challenges our faith to be serious and active. Talk to someone who tithes. You will most likely discover that they do not see the money they give away as the significant meaning of tithing. People who tithe usually want to talk about their faith and their love for God. Like the poor widow, your giving sacrificially will create immediately the risk of dependence upon God. Spiritual stretching through sacrificial giving can only lead to a deeper sense of God's presence in your life.

A NOTE FROM THE RECTOR

This coming Sunday will be the Second IN Lent. The Gospel will recall the Lord's Transfiguration (his metamorphosis) when to strengthen his disciples he is revealed to them in glory together with Moses (the Law) and Elijah (the Prophets). Peter pipes up wanting to stay on the hill top for a good long time...but he is silenced by the voice of the Father speaking from heaven and commanding them to LISTEN to his beloved Son. Do we listen to him? A good question to ask ourselves this coming week...or any time really. And listening, do we act? Jesus asked us a couple of weeks ago, "Why do you call me 'Lord, Lord', and do not do what I tell you?" Luke 6:46

Igor and family have moved to a safer place in Ukraine with other family members. Things are quieter but still a concern. Oleksii and his family are still in Kyiv. Please continue to pray for them and for Ukraine as requested in our prayer list above...and pray for the hearts of Russian leaders to soften and repent of their evil. HOW TO HELP THE VULNERABLE CAUGHT IN UKRAINE CRISIS



The conflict unfolding in Ukraine following invasion by Russian forces has been a shocking sight to witness over the past week.

Civilians are under attack and many thousands have had to flee Ukraine as refugees. We pray for peace.

Many of us have asked: how can we help? What can we do to support those who find themselves involved in a war they do not want?

Local initiatives are taking place across the country to provide funds and supplies for the vulnerable and those whose lives are at risk, and international aid agencies are appealing for support.

For those who would like to help but are unsure how to go about this, the College of Bishops would like to highlight two national donation schemes:

The Disasters Emergency Committee (DEC) Ukraine Humanitarian Appeal: <u>https://donation.dec.org.uk/ukraine-humanitarian-appeal</u> Among the DEC partners are Christian Aid, the British Red Cross, and Tearfund. The UK Government has pledged to match donations from the public to the DEC fund, pound-for-pound, up to £20 million
