+ SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 10:1-13

I do not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, that our ancestors were all under the cloud, and all passed through the sea, and all were baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea, and all ate the same spiritual food, and all drank the same spiritual drink. For they drank from the spiritual rock that followed them, and the rock was Christ. Nevertheless, God was not pleased with most of them, and they were struck down in the wilderness.

Now these things occurred as examples for us, so that we might not desire evil as they did. Do not become idolaters as some of them did; as it is written, "The people sat down to eat and drink, and they rose up to play." We must not indulge in sexual immorality as some of them did, and twenty-three thousand fell in a single day. We must not put Christ to the test, as some of them did, and were destroyed by serpents. And do not complain as some of them did, and were destroyed by the destroyer. These things happened to them to serve as an example, and they were written down to instruct us, on whom the ends of the ages have come. So if you think you are standing, watch out that you do not fall. No testing has overtaken you that is not common to everyone. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tested beyond your strength, but with the testing he will also provide the way out so that you may be able to endure it.

Hear the Good News of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Saint Luke:


Glory to Christ our Saviour!

At that very time there were some present who told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. He asked them, "Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were worse sinners than all other Galileans? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish as they did. Or those eighteen who were killed when the tower of Siloam fell on them--do you think that they were worse offenders than all the others living in Jerusalem? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish just as they did."

Then he told this parable: "A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it and found none. So he said to the gardener, 'See here! For three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree, and still I find none. Cut it down! Why should it be wasting the soil?' He replied, 'Sir, let it alone for one more year, until I dig around it and put manure on it. If it bears fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down."'

A STEWARDSHIP THOUGHT



OPEN WIDE YOUR HAND

"Open wide your hand, you shall give freely ... because for this the Lord your God will bless you in all your work ... For the poor will never cease out of the land; therefore I command you, you shall open wide your hand ...".....Deuteronomy 15:10-11

At the heart of the Torah, the "Law" or "instruction" of the Old Testament is a gospel-like sensitivity to one's fellow creature.

We are thrown together in this life with our neighbours, willy-nilly, and we are instructed to help them.

It is a command from the Lord, touching us at the deepest level of our humanity. This help will - indeed, the Bible implies must - be done freely, ungrudgingly. They, those in need, have the same right to live as we do. There, but for the grace of God, we ourselves might be.

We do not lose our self while doing this, however. We have needs also, and these are met by the blessing that the Lord returns to us in this giving. This blessing comes in many ways depending upon the person.

To some, it may come as a "good feeling," to others as a satisfaction in doing the Lord's work, to others perhaps as a way of dealing with guilt at their oversupply of this world's goods.

This is not selfishness. This is our reward from a God who has tied us all together by a common bond, allowing us to act as that brother or sister to the poor that we really are.

Each of us is thus given the opportunity of fulfilling our deepest self. Wouldn't it be great if we could go one step further and solve their problems, so that there would be no more poor? We are to work on that, too; but right now, today, the poor are with us, and the testimony of

Deuteronomy is right to say that they always will be with us. We could "harden our hearts," but we must not. They need us; we need them. We should not get entangled in agonizing questions such as, "Why did the Lord make the world this way?" This is a subtle step leading to an excuse to do nothing. The poor bring out, as it were, the humanity in us that otherwise would lay dormant. And, finally, we read not just "open your hand," but "open wide your hand." In that way we are acknowledging our connectedness to all humanity, we are showing our belief in the one Creator God, and we are receiving a wonderful blessing that we didn't start out to seek.

A NOTE FROM THE RECTOR

Dear All,

In this Sunday's readings we are reminded of our Baptism. Lent, from its earliest days, was seen as a time to prepare people (called catechumens) for their Baptism. In the early days they would have been preparing for several years as the Church needed to be sure of their commitment. Sadly that relaxed when Christianity became legal and persecution ended...and now we rarely speak of that commitment...response to God's call.

But how often does Jesus, himself, spell out the cost of following him! "Take up your cross...", "Sell everything you have and give to the poor...", "Judge not and you will not be judged...", "Give to all who ask..." "Love as you are loved..." "Take, eat...Drink this..." I could go on, but I think the point is made.

We are constantly challenged to remember who we are and who we are called to be...and all of this is rooted in our Baptism.

Let us ponder, over the coming week, our Baptismal Promises. Bishop Mark spoke eloquently of those promises at Synod last Saturday...and challenged us all to consider making a public renewal of them when next he visits...and receive a fresh blessing. I provide them here. All of them are rooted and grounded in the teachings of our Lord:

Celebrant: Do you reaffirm your renunciation of evil and renew your commitment to Jesus

Christ?

People: I do.

Celebrant: Do you believe in God the Father?

People: I believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth.

Celebrant: Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

People: I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power

of the Holy Spirit and was born of the Virgin Mary, he suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand

of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

Celebrant: Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

People: I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Holy Catholic Church, the communion of saints,

the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.

Celebrant: Will you continue in the apostles= teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread,

and in the prayers?

People: I will, with God's help.

Celebrant: Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return

to the Lord?

People: I will, with God's help.

Celebrant: Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ?

People: I will, with God's help.

Celebrant: Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbour as yourself?

People: I will, with God's help.

Celebrant: Will you strive for justice and peace among all people and respect the dignity of eve-

ry human being?

People: I will, with God's help.

UKRAINIAN REGUGEE HELP

Our dear sister Gail wrote this last week...details have since come out from the Government...and the Bishop has also encouraged us to consider the cause. I have voiced my willingness to host.

Dear Friends.

We have all been profoundly disturbed by what we have seen unfolding in Ukraine these past two weeks and feel a sense of inadequacy and impotence to reach out in a meaningful way. This morning I was listening to a news broadcast dealing with refugees coming into the U.K. and the woeful government response to this. However they are planning to open a route whereby individuals, charities, local councils etc can sponsor a refugee family and I had a 'lightbulb' moment. Surely this is something we as the Black Isle Charge can do? We see on our tv screens images of young mothers with a babe in arms and a toddler clutching their hand and we are reminded of our Lord fleeing into Egypt in his mother's arms. We are called to be Jesus' voice and hands in the world, so let us respond. Can I urge you to consider this and send your thoughts via your reps for discussion by the Vestry. Details of how the scheme will work have not yet been finalised but we can be ahead of the game by holding preliminary discussions, identifying a holiday cottage that might be available etc etc so that we are ready to submit a sponsorship form as soon as the system becomes operational.


I leave this with you but appeal to you all to give it prayerful consideration.
