THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

Lord, teach us to number our days. Turn, O Lord! How long? Have compassion on your servants! Satisfy us in the morning with your steadfast love, so that we may rejoice and be glad all our days.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

Saint Margaret of Scotland

(16 Nov)



Born in the year 1046, Margaret was the daughter of the Anglo-Saxon royal house of England but educated in Hungary, where her family lived in exile during the reigns of Danish kings in England. After the Norman invasion in 1066, when still her royal person was a threat to the new monarchy, she was welcomed in the royal court of Malcolm III of Scotland and soon afterwards married him in 1069. Theirs was a happy and fruitful union and Margaret proved to be both a civilising and a holy presence. She was a woman of prayer as well as good works who seemed to influence for good all with whom she came into contact. She died on this day in 1093.
