### **OPERATION SHOEBOX UPDATE**

A great start to the new year, with 7 of us at the Lodge on Friday and we managed to wrap 29 boxes with lots of laughter, conversation and tea and cakes in between. It's always a good time to meet up and help put together boxes that will look so joyful, colourful and ready to be filled later in the year with lots of essential items for their recipients. I was just thinking and praying about the boxes for this year, and I realised that we have sent 1,146 boxes to Eastern Europe in the last 3 years of our group's work. That means 1,146 men, women and children have received a powerful sign of God's love through administering to their needs in time of poverty, war, or displacement. It is also a powerful sign that shows they are thought of and loved from thousands of miles away.

We received a certificate for 2023's donation, and so I have attached it.

Our next box wrapping session will be held on Friday 23rd of February, at the Lodge, Fortrose, between 2-4pm. For the month of February, we would welcome donations of bars of soap please.

### BLYTHSWOOD THANKSGIVING CELEBRATION

On Saturday 27th January, Trish McKeggie and I went to the Culduthel Christian Centre for the Thanksgiving celebrations and for the retiral of James Campbell, Chief Executive, and for the baton being handed over to Minister Jeremy Ross, whose father Jackie Ross was one of those young Ministers to start the Blythswood organisation back in Glasgow in 1966.

It was such a beautiful service, with great worship songs, wonderful band, and powerful prayers. Throughout the service, we were shown videos of the amazing work done in Eastern Europe, from Romanian orphanages, as they were, and I know I can remember those haunting news bulletins from the time. Babies, children, chained to their cots, left to cry and then learn not to cry, in soiled linen, hungry and alone. Rocking backwards and forwards, I remember it sadly. The powerful videos of the people of Romania, Hungary, Budapest, Burundi, India, Ukraine, Moldova, their gratitude, their joy at receiving care, physically, medically and spiritually from Blythswood volunteers, builders, care workers, young people workers, getting the young teenagers off the streets, equipping them with hope, meeting their educational needs, physical and mental needs, giving them a stable place to learn new skills, to equip them for life and earning a living to get out of poverty. Sending aid and containers of ambulances, medical equipment, food etc. to Burundi and to India, helping them to help themselves, and all because God loves us, we can help those in need, and who need us.

This is faith at work. And the shoeboxes are part of that! How lovely to see the faces and smiles as they received their boxes. I sat there with Trish, and at times was so tearful because of the power of the work being done, and as James Campbell, (retiring CEO) took us through the last 26 years of his work, he was tearful at times too. It is so humbling to see the joy and comfort that the boxes bring to those who have nothing, the displaced, the desperate, the marginalised of their communities. Let us always be looking to Jesus for his guidance, and to be there for those in need.

Very powerful, very memorable. May God bless Jeremy Ross in his new role, and we give him our prayers, and support in challenges ahead, as there is always so much more to be done, for those in need.
